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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

When our Pacific Northwest region District Executive, Janine Larson, visited in January, she spoke to us about embracing change. Now, if you are like me, you embrace the idea of change in theory. I am particularly happy with change when someone else changes to meet my needs. Alas, the world doesn't work like that. And truth be told, we UU's are committed to change\spiritual growth as it were. We like it when we can meander down our own paths and change directions. We are not so happy when external situations not of our choosing force us to change. Let's face it, until we reach enlightenment (next year?), we will want to control our lives and we will resist being compelled to change.

The board recently sponsored a workshop to inform committee members (who's not?) about a model for behavior we intend to adopt that will allow us to gracefully accept change. It is commonly called the Deming model, or "Continuous Improvement," or "Plan, Do, Study, Act." [Google it!] In this model, people commit to an ongoing process of envisioning, implementing, evaluating, reflecting and re-acting, and then re-visioning. Our focus for the board is to help committees -- over the next few years -- adopt this process, and to work on envisioning a plan for their committee (mission). From there, committees will determine how they will gauge the success of their activities, and report to the board their findings, and their intended re-visioning process. My experience in business and in teaching is that if we do not embrace the continuous improvement model, then the -- salience of the traditional -- takes over, and we continue to do "the same old thing" because "that's the way it's always been done."

Continuous improvement requires that people adopt a more objective, scientific stance and commit to the process, not attach to the outcome. For an example of this: the Sunday Services Committee will be changing start times for the services beginning this month. The board is interested in how they will assess the success or failure of the time change to achieve their stated goal. The board also wants the Program Ministry Council to evaluate the affect on all other ministries. This requires obtaining and interpreting both quantitative and qualitative data. Data tells a story, and like any story, can either illumine or obscure the truth. Hence, continuous reflection, continuous improvement.

VISION STATEMENT: To plan oversee, and participate in creating the landscape of the four-acre Boise Unitarian-Universalist Fellowship's (BUUF) property at Garrett and Chelan, the landscape committee (Committee) will be guided by the spirit of the BUUF Mission Statement, which emphasizes supporting each individual's (Member, Friend, Neighbor) search for growth and meaning and to promote a diverse and nurturing community and landscape in harmony with the natural world.

GOALS:

- -To create a landscape in harmony with the spirit of community that is the BUUF essence, and in harmony with the climate and soils of the arid Boise environment
- -To invite, encourage and assist members and friends of the Fellowship to be the creators and curators of the landscape
- -To minimize water requirements, time and cost for continued maintenance of the landscape
- -To provide maximum accessibility to all portions of the property for everyone.

BUUF Landscape isn't one simple organization. No, we have three distinctly different parts to us. So when you hear of 'Landscape', it could be one, two or three different elements. We've got the Landscape Committee, the Landscape Gardeners, and the Landscape Mowers and (Weed) Whackers. Some of us operate

in one, two or three of these categories. It's also important to recognize that we're all vital, there is no hierarchy; we just have different responsibilities and/or interests.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

Honoring Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

The Idaho Foodbank has a food backpack program for grade school age students. Bundles of nourishing but easily prepared foods are put into the backpacks of selected children at the end of each school week. Each bundle is designed to contain sufficient food for one child for one weekend. The program is directed toward chronically undernourished children, who are identified by school administrators.

Approximately 30 people from the Boise Unitarian Universalist Fellowship (BUUF) celebrated Martin Luther King Day by preparing backpack food bundles. Our participants worked as part of a larger group of approximately 80 volunteers. The food bundles were assembled on a line in plastic bags. At each station, one food item was added to the plastic bag. By the time the bag reached the end of the line, it contained all the designated food items. In a little over an hour, 1,100 food bundles were prepared by our team while another team at the other end of the building prepared a similar number of food bundles.

Over 6000 of these food bundles were prepared during the day. All the BUUF participants had a great time and left the Foodbank with a sense of accomplishment. It seems like a most appropriate way to honor Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Are You Hungry?

You'll probably answer no, but many people around you experience food insecurity every day. If you have an interest in making sure that everyone in our community has access to food, please join us at our monthly Hunger/Food Supply Task Force meeting. We meet at 6:30 pm in the north RE wing on the first Monday of each month (February 7 this month). Come explore the problems and help us figure out solutions.

Hunger Action and the Capital City Market

Eating more fresh fruits and vegetables is good for all of us. It is especially good if you are using Food Stamps and have been relying on lowcost foods, which may be higher in fats and sugars. This spring, for the second year, the Capitol City Public Market, where local growers sell fresh produce, is going to accept Food Stamps.

We, BUUF, will again operate the machine that transforms Food Stamp benefits into tokens that can be used at the Market to buy fresh food. This activity works on behalf of economic justice and makes BUUF a more visible presence in our community. Many BUUF members and friends participated in this volunteer activity in the 2010 Market season, and know how enjoyable and rewarding it is.

Once again, we will be using the grant from the Wholesome Wave Foundation and our donated funds to make it easier for Food Stamp Users to buy fresh produce. For every dollar used on the Food Stamp Card, up to ten dollars, the Wholesome Wave Foundation and BUUF will add a dollar, doubling the Food Stamp recipient's buying power.

Our social outreach funds in February will be used for this worthy purpose. 25% of non-pledged plate donations will go to this fund. If you write a check to BUUF with "outreach" on the memo line, all of your donation will go to the fund.

This project is win-win. It benefits Food Stamp recipients, local farmers, the local economy, and BUUF by making us a greater presence in the community for good works.

Whittier School Hygiene Kits

Nurse Adde of Whittier School plans to pass out the hygiene kits starting in March. While we have a wonderful start with shampoo, conditioner and soap, we still need combs, pencils, toothpaste (small size preferred, but anything welcome) and hair accessories. The RE kids are going to collect new or gently used books that will be put in the kits also. The deadline for donations is February 20. Thank you for your generosity towards our partner school! 

A New Twist To Christmas Shopping -- Helping Kids In Need

Boise Unitarian Universalist Fellowship recently raised more than \$2,500 for The Idaho Foodbank Backpack Program, which provides food each Friday for children who might not have food over the weekend.

The fundraiser sold "gift cards" giving a donation to the program on someone's behalf and started because of a lack of gift ideas.



Sevier made little cloth backpacks for gift card holders, and Anthony, who prefers to go simply by his first name, designed the cards. All the time and materials to create the cards and card holders were donated.

"This is really neat because it allows a person to donate to a charitable cause, but also give something tangible to the gift recipient," Anthony said.

The funds will go toward the Backpack Program that supports Whittier Elementary, which the church has "adopted" in recent years. According to Sheila Ames, another fundraiser organizer, the church tries to ensure Whittier students have everything they need.

"The Backpack program is great," Sevier said, "because it serves a really vulnerable population who can't really help themselves."

Last March, the plate collection for the Backpack Program raised \$1,500. Ames said they plan to have more plate offerings for the program and do the holiday gift cards fundraiser again next year.

"Our goal is to fund all the backpacks that go to Whittier," Ames said. The Idaho Foodbank sends 21 backpacks to Whittier each week.



The group also participated in The Idaho Foodbank's "Feed the Dream: Martin Luther King Jr. Day of Service" on Monday, January 17, volunteering to assemble the food packs that go out to students.

All the food provided through the Backpack Program is purchased through corporate and individual donations. Each weekend backpack costs \$6.20. The cost to sponsor one child for one month is \$24.80, for an entire school year the cost is \$229.40.

Through funding and support, you can provide nutrition for hungry children, because no child should have to go hungry.

Jess McGinnis, Mike's wife and mother to Gabe and Sam, reads a poem entitled "Indian Children." Liz Mummey (Assiniboine), a member of the Native American Coalition of Boise (NACOB), shares an oral tradition story with BUUF children entitled Why the Bear Has a Short Tail. After the candle is extinguished at the end of the service, everyone (adults and children) takes part in a friendship round dance.






BUUF camping 2011!
